I used to wonder: "What's the point?" "What did I get sober for?" "Is it worth it so far?" "Why am I still bored?" If you have to think too hard on any of these questions there might just be one more drunk left in you.

Sandy Beach once said: you're not relatively happy and satisfied in recovery, then you're probably doing it wrong so find

someone who can help you with the steps." Much of the richness and excitement in my life is directly related to the principles and actions behind the steps.

Step 1 gives me heartfelt gratitude for everything I now have and for everything God graciously took out of my life.


Step 2 reminds me of the insanity of alcoholism and that today I can choose to avoid the chaos and drama and live a peaceful life.

Step 3 reminds me that God is in charge, and that I have been given so many wonderful gifts beyond my comprehension or understanding. I only need to surrender and get out of His way.

Steps 4 & 5 remind me that the vast changes in my life are just a scant beginning. There will be many more wonderful growth opportunities coming my way.

Steps 6 & 7 give me direction and focus while God molds me into the man I am meant to be.

Steps 8, 9, & 10 keep my life relatively free of the clutter of fear and resentment. I no longer need to fight with people, institutions, or principles.



Step 12 lets me practice gratitude by passing these wonderful gifts forward. I really do believe that it is all about love and service. In exchange God has provided me with everything I could possibly need: physically, emotionally and spiritually.

In one of my first meetings there was a group of old-timers who described everything I have experienced. They said that my life would change entirely, that I would need less money and possessions but, I would have much more fun with so much less. My hardened heart would open up and I would find peace and grace. I was both excited and skeptical. It sounded like a group of evangelical AA zealots, but I distinctly remember looking into their eyes and seeing truth and peace.

So, are you enjoying sobriety? On a meditation site I read daily there was some pseudo-sarcasm at the end of the page. It stated: "If you're not enjoying your sobriety, it's your own damn fault!"


Where and When: A new list will be out soon.






