On page 20 of the Big Book it says "our very lives, as ex-problem drinkers, depend upon constant thought of others and how we may meet their needs." This is not an attempt to be overly dramatic, but absolute fact. It's easy to look

around the rooms and pick out the people who are content and satisfied in their lives and their sobriety. These are the *givers*, the folks doing that loving service.

I have been blessed with several old-timers who have, through the years, taught me how to be of maximum use. Quite often just entering a

room and seeing Marshall, Wanda, Corliss, Joseph H., or Papa John would let us know that we are going to be alright. Just "suiting up and showing up" is a good start, and see how you can be of service.

Dorothy once said that the program was all about learning to love; something we had apparently forgotten in our self-imposed prison of inebriated chaos. It was also Dorothy who pointed out that we often have difficulty accepting unconditional love and that the receiving part is a gift for the other person. Perhaps that is the reason that God put us all together as one big wonderful family!

Mostly there was talk of his problems with mental health and abuse, of which I can surely relate. But I began to wonder if the woman would hear anything that would relate to her problems as they pertain to drinking. I have yet to see the woman at another meeting.

Certainly, I do not take well to the attitude of anyone telling me how to share in AA. After my first time telling my story, my sponsor spoke with me after regarding our "Singleness of Purpose" as my story included many other problems besides alcohol. My first response was one of rebellion. "This is a new AA" I thought. I have many friends who suffered from the needle and other substances who have chosen AA because it is where they feel most at home. Who can blame them, the fellowship is amazing, as well as the literature. This, in hindsight, is certainly not placing principles before personalities. What about the penthouse

wine drunk who cannot relate to our talks of opioid use? Certainly, they would feel that they do not belong when we speak of such things. And is it not us who are breaking tradition because we feel that these other problems are so essential to our AA story?

What about these other addicts who have recovered so well and become sober, happy members of AA and society? I must think of one of my very best AA friends. He suffered from heroin dependence yet when he shares he sticks to the traditions and speaks only of his alcohol use. He has not only found sobriety, but he has blossomed and continues to do so and is well loved by the members of our community. Surely we can all learn from him, if we choose to make AA our fellowship. That is placing the principle of one alcoholic relating to another, above anything else. And that is the purpose of AA.`


