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Importance of a Home Group

First of all, I never liked being a part of ANY organization, particularly one that had rules and regulations, policies and procedures. Liked to call myself a "lone wolf", my own man. I found out that most of my brothers and sisters in recovery have had that same arrogant attitude. When I first read that "defiance is the outstanding characteristic of many an alcoholic" I took it as a compliment. My sponsor, of course, asked me how that was working for me. For once I was speechless.

As my sobriety progressed it was suggested that I get real familiar with the traditions- how to play well with others. The home group became the key in my progress, and a very important part of my survival. My active participation in my home group gives me a huge bundle of gifts. First, that sense of belonging ends my (default) isolation, that lonely poison that kills so many of us.. Secondly, rotating positions of service within the group cause me to be accountable to the group as a whole, and the individual members. Finally, being a part of my group allows that spirit of love and service to flow through me. Perhaps I am becoming a participating member of society after all!

I have never been particularly religious, but I strongly believe that I have thus far survived the ravishes of alcoholism due to that "Grace of God" so many old-timers talk about. These are the same people that suggested that service work is the main factor that will keep me "usefully whole" and fully engaged in recovery. Being ACTIVE in a home group is one sure way to keep this normally reclusive alcoholic accountable, to save me from the bondage of self.

My First Lifeline in AA

No one ever comes dancing and signing a happy tune into AA. At least that is NOT the way I arrived to the rooms. I didn't want to drink anymore, I didn't want to live the life I had anymore, BUT I didn't want to become part of AA. I didn't want to get to know anyone, I didn't want any new friends. I wanted my old friends, and I wanted to hang out at all my old 'holes'.

I was willing to take a few of the suggestions, like go to meetings and I did get a sponsor. I had no intention of staying long term. I figured I'd to these 12 step things and graduate and return to my life. The first thing my sponsor "suggested" I do was join a home group. I asked if it was absolutely necessary and her answer was "only if I didn't want to die". Pretty extreme, I thought., but I did it.

I remember the first time I was invited to dinner a few home group members after the meeting ... It was so awkward, but they accepted me and invited me to the next time out. I got a position within that homegroup, I now had a reason that I had to show up - people depended on me. I had not been dependable in a very long time, and it felt good.

In the beginning of my sobriety, this home group - this group of women - were my life line. IF I didn't show up, they called to check on me. They made me feel worthy. They loved me until ... until I was able to accept their love and friendship.

How important is having a homegroup? In my opinion, it is the difference to learning to live or being able to slip through the cracks of recovery and die.

Then too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority."

When reflecting on these things, why should not each of us tell himself, "Yes, we A.A.s were once a burden on everybody. We were 'takers.' Now that we are sober, and by the Grace of God have become responsible citizens of the world, why shouldn't we now about face and become 'thankful givers'! Yes, it is high time we did!".


