FAITH OVER FEAR



The twelve steps didn't give me my life back; they gave me a life I never knew was possible. In AA, I have learned much more than how to stop drinking. I've learned how to be a productive member of society, face life's difficulties, care about myself and others, live in today, and pause. I am especially grateful to AA for teaching me how to have a faith that works.

In practicing step three, I realized the difference between believing in God and having a faith that works in all circumstances. With recent world events, I've been given opportunities for extra practice in turning over the people, circumstances, and institutions which are out of my control. The pandemic has given me perspective in how much I am in fact not God. I have no control over this invisible monster, but I do have tools to help me cope with fears that crop up. Once I become willing to let go, I can make a beginning toward relief from the tyranny of both real and imagined fears, many of which I would have gotten drunk over in the past.

In step four, I learned to acknowledge my fears and see how they drive my reactions. In the steps that follow, I can take more action by trusting God to remove them, righting my wrongs, and helping others. The steps give me tools to deal with my fears and continue trudging the path in front of me with an ever-present sense of peace, and that promise doesn't falter when the whole world seems to be upside down. I haven't experienced instantaneous relief from my fears, but I have been shown the way to accessing serenity and

gratitude in everything. I used to scoff at people of faith, but now I'm thankful for all the ways faith has carried me through difficult days and it will carry me through each difficulty ahead. My job in all of this is to trust God, clean house, and help others as I go. –MC

The Steps are HOW IT WORKS. The Traditions are WHY IT WORKS.

"Each group has but one primary purpose $oldsymbol{-}$ to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers. ."

Alcoholics Anonymous tradition five long form states: "Each alcoholics anonymous group ought to be a spiritual entity having but one primary purpose – that of carrying its message to the alcoholic who still suffers."

When we speak about the spiritual entity, I begin by remembering the twelfth step "Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all of our affairs."

The key in step five is that as a result of working these steps, we are granted a spiritual awakening and have to give it away in order to keep it. The same applies to groups. Within the twelve steps and the twelve traditions is an ideal; because we have the unique experience of reaching the deepest depths of alcoholism and with the program outlined in the Big Book, we can recover.

When as a group we apply ourselves to this ideal, we can help others to recover. When we help others to recover, our sobriety in turn is enhanced. Therefore, for our continued survival as groups and individuals, we must carry the message of AA to the still suffering alcoholics.

When we take the 12 steps into our hearts and minds and decide as a group to carry the message of AA to the still suffering alcoholic, the opportunities abound. We have a variety of opportunities within AA to carry the message. We have an abundance of committees such as Treatment, Corrections, CP/CPI, Grapevine, Accessibilities and many more. We should always work together to extend the hand of Alcoholics Anonymous. –CM

"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."

Out of the twelve steps, the fifth step is my favorite. In my experience, the fifth step changed how I look at things and helped repair relationships in my-life especially with my family. When I came into the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous, I had a deep-seated resentment against my whole family - my parents and my brothers. I had an awesome sponsor who was brutally honest and tough but also gentle. She was exactly what I needed to get the most out of doing my fifth step. During my fourth step, I was looking forward to writing my inventories. I couldn't wait to show my sponsor and hear her say, "Wow, I'm so sorry. You've really had a rough go at things. I can't believe they would do that to you." Boy, was I wrong. My sponsor showed me different aspects of my life that my inventories affected (personal relations, self-esteem, etc.). Through the fifth step, I was able to realize that over the years, my parents were dealing with an untreated alcoholic. As an untreated alcoholic, I was miserable, nasty, and spiteful wrapped in a bow of self-pity. Who would want to be around or deal with an untreated alcoholic like that? I was able to see my part in my resentments and learn that there are things that I can control to change the outcome and things that I can't control. I learned to accept people, things, and situations as they were, which was really difficult for me. When I told my mom about my fifth step, it was a huge turning point in our relationship and she even apologized to me for her part. Today, my mom is my best friend and she's extremely supportive of my recovery. I have gone through the steps again but in my experience, there is nothing like going through the steps for the first time. I am so grateful for the people in Alcoholics Anonymous and the twelve steps. If you put the effort in, this program really works. -KP





From the General Service Office regarding COVID-19

In these unprecedented times we must be mindful of not only our own health, but of the health of others in our group, families and communities. There are resources! This is what has been published on AA.org:

Our collected experience suggests that groups that are unable to meet at their usual meeting places have begun to meet digitally; doing so in a sensible and helpful manner to allow the group to continue keeping the focus on our common welfare and primary purpose. Some groups that are still meeting in person have shared about making changes to customs at their meetings. Some examples have included: avoiding shaking hands and handholding; making sure meeting hospitality tables are sanitary; or suspending food hospitality for the time being. Many groups have also made contingency plans in case the group is temporarily unable to meet in person. Regardless of group decisions, each individual is responsible for their own health decisions. Contingency plans have included: creating contact lists and keeping in touch by phone, email or social media; meeting by phone or online. If a group isn't holding its regular meetings, they may want to communicate this to local A.A. resources, such as the district, area and intergroup or central office. Many local A.A. entities have added information to their websites about how to change a meeting format from "in-person" to online. Some groups have shared that they are utilizing digital platforms such as Zoom, Google Hangouts, or a conference call. Some groups have also added a "virtual Seventh Tradition basket" to remain self-supporting and to keep up the services at the group and the A.A. entities that serve them.
