When I think of the word "Cultivate," the first thing I think of is someone tending to a flower garden. I picture a woman on her hands and knees, tilling soil, sowing seeds and pulling weeds. She installs a pond and carefully places garden gnomes and other figures that she admires around all of her favorite blooms. She devotes long hours and days to developing her labor of love. Then I envision her one day standing in front of the colorful and lush end product. It is full of magic and brimming with life. She is smiling from ear to ear. It was not easy and some days she did not want to show up for her garden, but she did it anyways and her devotion paid off.

This imagery is comparable for me to my experience with practicing gratitude. It wasn't until a couple years into sobriety that I started to be able to recognize that it was truly working. I do believe that writing gratitude lists and speaking gratitude was instrumental in keeping me sober in early sobriety. However, as I have tended to my practice of thinking, praying and writing down thankful thoughts, it has become a tool that can instantly change my attitude and the course of my day.

I started writing gratitude lists during the beginning weeks of my sobriety in AA because my sponsor told me to. I was absolutely desperate to stay sober so I followed her experienced guidance and didn't even question her suggestions. There was no thought involved — I just did what I was told. It was a robotic act at first and I was "faking it until I made it," but the daily action was replacing the many habits that I had been cultivating when I was drinking.

Magic began happening for me and I was struck with gratitude and faith when I started to realize that I did not want to drink anymore. I had never been more amazed or appreciative in



my entire life. I could not believe it. The suggestions were working for me exactly as promised. To this day I am still instantly and endlessly grateful that the problem has been removed when I consider what a miracle it is.

However, over the years as I have walked through adversities and fears that are associated with showing up and living this new life without hiding and burying my feelings, I have often had to grasp into the darkness to find gratitude. When things get hard I don't want to be grateful because my natural tendency is to feel sorry for myself. But I have witnessed the charm and relief that gratitude lends to my life and the lives of others, so I have started practicing it intuitively. It has gradually become what comes naturally to me and it often feels like a close friend. I always have access to it and it will always help me when I am in need.

My gratitude practice also brings me closer to the people I care about and my Higher Power and for that I am grateful. I think I will keep working on it, day by day, and trusting that it will continue to transform my attitude, my way of thinking and my entire life. -TS

### From AA Grapevine, September 1948

The least possible organization, that's our universal ideal. No fees, or dues, no rules imposed on anybody, one alcoholic bringing recovery to the next; that's the substance of what we most desire, isn't it? But how shall this simple ideal best be realized? Often a question, that. We have, for example, the kind of AA who is for simplicity. Terrified of anything organized, he tells us that AA is getting too complicated. He thinks money only makes trouble, committees only make dissension, elections only make politics, paid workers only make professionals, and clubs only coddle slippers. Says he, let's get back to coffee and cakes by cozy firesides. If any alcoholics stray our way, let's look after the. But that's enough. Simplicity is our answer. Quite opposed to such halcyon simplicity is the AA promoter. Left to himself, he would "bang the cannon and twang the lyre" at every crossroad of the world. Millions for drunks, great AA hospitals, batteries of paid organizer, and publicity experts wielding all the latest 6 paraphernalia of sound and script; such would be our promoters dream. "Yes, sir," he would bark. "My two -year plan calls for one million AA members by 1950!" For one, I'm glad we have both conservatives and enthusiasts. They teach us much. The conservative will surely see to it that the AA movement never gets overly organized.

But the promoter will continue to remind us of our terrific obligation to the newcomer and to those hundreds of thousands of alcoholics still waiting all over the world to hear of AA. We shall, naturally, take the firm and safe middle course. AA has always violently resisted the idea of any general organization. Yet, paradoxically, we have ever stoutly insisted upon organizing certain special services; mostly those absolutely necessary to effective and plentiful Twelfth Step work. If, for instance, an AA group elects a secretary or rotating committee, if an area forms an intergroup committee, if we set up a foundation, a general office or a Grapevine, then we are organized for service. The AA book and pamphlets, our meeting places and clubs, our dinners and regional assemblies -- these are services, too. Nor can we secure good hospital connections, properly sponsor new prospects, and obtain good public relations just by chance. People have to be appointed to look after these things, sometimes paid people. Special services are performed. But by none of these special services has our spiritual or social activity, the great current of AA, ever been really organized or professionalized. Yet our recovery program has been enormously aided. While important, these service activities are very small by contrast with our main effort. As such facts and distinctions become clear, we shall easily lay aside our fears of blighting organization or hazardous wealth. As a movement, we shall remain comfortably poor, for our service expenses are trifling. With such assurances, we shall without doubt continue to improve and extend our vital lifelines of special service; to better carry our AA message to others; to make for ourselves a finer, greater Society, and, God willing, to assure Alcoholics Anonymous a long life and perfect unity.

## **Step 9** "Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others."



I have found that there is so much spiritual depth to them. The more I practiced this step the more I found out how much healing comes from it and not just for me. As in many harms done, I found that it just wasn't "I" who had it all twisted up. In opening up some past wrongs and in making those amends, many dear and wonderful people have also received healing, an understanding and answers to stuff they were holding on to for far too long. The truth also set them free.

So when I become aware of an injury I have caused another person, I gladly bear my soul of my wrong-doing so that the other person doesn't have to carry around any excess garbage, twist their mind over and over again trying to make sense from the Mack truck that just ran them over. How blessed we are to become free from our past and be given the gift to help free another. –SA

#### JULY 26, 2020

ATTENDANCE –GN (Chair), BC (Alt Chair), JW (Secretary), PC (Alt Secretary), PB (Treasurer), MR (Alt Treas), FS (Office Mgr), WM (Webmaster), TS (POST), AW, AO, NG, and JH (13 people in attendance).

MINUTES – JW presented the June meeting minutes (page 7 of the POST). Minutes were approved. Due to Zoom meeting format, JW requested to be notified of any Intergroup Rep. changes or contact information changes and WM offered to post the request with email address for submission of changes on the website.

TREASURER'S REPORT – PB presented the June treasurer's report (page 8 of the POST). Office reserves held in CD's totals \$11,026.33. One CD matures in April, 2021 and the second CD matures in June, 2021. An additional \$601.13 is held in fluid reserves. Additional contributions to office reserves will be added to the fluid funds to avoid cashing any CD's before maturity. It was reported that, while not reflected in the June Report, contributions by individuals and groups in July have been good. The report was accepted unanimously.

PHONE COMMITTEE – Chair could not attend, and no update was given. The 24 hour phones appear to be well covered.

POST – TS reported some formatting changes made; since it may be difficult for groups to report birthdays, late birthdays can be added to the next edition, if reported by the submission deadline (12th of the month). TS will work with FS to pare down the larger online version for hard copy printing. Compliments were made about the POST and TS' efforts.

LITERATURE & MERCHANDISE/WHERE & WHEN – FS commended the Intergroup Office volunteers for their efforts. The office remains closed only on Mondays. Wearing a mask is required, and only one may enter at a time. Literature and merchandise is well stocked and welcoming conversation always available.

WEBSITE – WM reported the website continues to receive daily changes in meeting schedules and is up to date on both online and re-activated in-person meetings. Two volunteers assisted beta-testing new forms to reporting meeting updates and the forms have been fixed to perform properly. He is currently working on a system of webpages to automate special event notices so outdated notices will be timely removed. WM is monitoring and renewing 3 secondary domain names to ensure proper forwarding to AAGainesville.org and avoid any misdirection people could incur when searching for our website.

ACTIVITES – Chair not present; usual events held in recent months were cancelled. There is an effort to put together a combination Gratitude Dinner and Founders Day event, possibly November 7, 2020.

DCM REPORT – Not present; GN attended the last District meeting. 8 people attended. The District is obtaining an online payment link and will provide it to our webmaster to be added to our website.

OLD BUSINESS – The Intergroup Bylaws were previously provided to Representatives and discussion was held about a change in the election schedule. The existing election schedule made it impossible for an Alternate Officer who had been training for a specific Officer position to move into that position when the Officer election was held. A motion was made to change the existing date for election of Alternate officers (June) to be held the same date that the Officers are elected (December), enabling an Alternate Officer (who would now be exiting the Alternate position in December) to move directly into the Officer position. The motion was seconded and unanimously accepted.

NEW BUSINESS – Nothing new raised
