SURRENDER. THEN SURRENDER AGAIN.

I wanted to die. I didn't know why. I kept running into this problem. I had been sober for three years and still had unavailing ideation. It's a typical story some of us experience. It's not that we want to "kill ourselves":

it's simply that we do not want to live. Some describe it as wanting to evaporate from existence. This is what I was experiencing and led me to take my white chip three years prior, and those same feelings beset me now.

So, what did I do? I did what the twelve-step program of AA taught me to do. I surrendered. I surrendered my life. I surrendered my mind and my body for I suffered from "a hopeless state of mind and body". The mental illness of alcoholism and (I later learned) bipolar 2. These two illnesses co-occur in me and require treatment. Unfortunately, just keeping a tight AA program was not enough

AND I need to work a

solid program for a daily reprieve from alcoholism. Is your head spinning yet? No pun, but mine certainly was.

I had to surrender everything. Even surrender a desire to live. And then it happened. After I'd spent 45 minutes with my therapist on the phone —talking me down, I sat in my driveway, car and lights off. I'm not sure why the lit windows of my home caught my eye the way they did or what imaginings into my child's future were created before me, but I began to sob. That

kind of sob that emerges from nether regions of your soul you didn't know existed. You know what I'm talking about? Well, until that moment, I wouldn't have known.

I felt something upon that grand surrender that I had never in my 47 years of life experienced.

I wanted to live.

Never had I noticed that I had never *wanted* to live. I had looked forward to events or reaching milestones, sure. But If someone had asked me when I was 12, 16, 27, 35...."Do you want to live?" I can't say that "yes" would have been the answer. Yes, I want to live. Even writing that sentence feels odd still. But on that late May evening of this year, I had a spiritual experience of the sort the big book details. I was bawling, I was scared, but I knew right then and without any doubt, I wanted to live to watch my child grow. I want to live. Yep, still weird.

This is what COMPLETE surrender looked like for me.

This thing, life, is a journey. We have no control over any of it. We just don't. The more I surrender to my higher power the more I get to live this life. I can't explain this. It makes no sense to me. It flies in the face of what I have been taught in this culture to believe about myself and how life works. If you're struggling, hurting, or having any challenges this holiday, try a new level of surrender. And then surrender again. Surrender it all. And maybe feel a little free.

Tradition 12

The Steps are HOW IT WORKS.
The Traditions are WHY IT WORKS.

"Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities."

Principles First - People Second

Why are we repeatedly asked in the Traditions to give up ourselves for the greater good? The answer is because any relationship we have that does not involve sacrifice is a relationship that likely will not endure. Each tradition straightens out a disastrous attitude we had about relationships. The twelfth tradition teaches us that a spirit of sacrifice (often times through anonymity) is vital to good relationships.

Giving up the expectation of rewards for doing good is difficult for most of us. It's easy for us to give and then think, "Well, I'll get a reward, even if I don't get public recognition for what I did." To remove that reward symbol from the back of our minds for whatever good we do is part of practicing anonymity. The next

time you hear a speaker in A.A. whose personality is exciting from the platform, see if you can hear the principles behind their words? To which step, tradition, or concept can you relate their pitch? Setting ourselves aside and focusing on the principles of our program is a crucial component in the foundation we need for studying the Traditions and learning how to be in healthier relationships with our fellow A.A.'s and with those in the world around us.

Step-Tradition Parallel

The twelfth step poses the question, "What is a spiritual awakening?" I believe that the evidences of a spiritual awakening are found in a person who practices the twelfth tradition in all their affairs. Such a person sacrifices self in order to practice principles. Their motive in practicing all of the traditions is anonymity: they sacrifice to help others.

The twelfth tradition completes the twelfth step in the following way: I become spiritually awake when I carry the message by anonymously practicing sober principles.

(Excerpts from the text above come from the Traditions Study developed by the Unity Insures Recovery Through Service A.A. Group, Los Angeles, CA.)

Let us always remember that anonymity—not taking credit for our own or others' recovery—is humility at work. Sacrificing Personal ambition for the common good

In my opinion, the most important aspect of Step 12 is providing a safe, reliable, and relatable atmosphere of recovery that attracts new people to the promises of the program. This atmosphere gets obscured by personalities. What does the meeting say to the newcomer? "Come on, we are here for you?" Or "We are pretty indifferent to you, but if you work for it, we will notice you?" Or, worse yet, "You are hot, glad you are here?" People are literally dying to get into recovery, and we have to make every effort to provide hope and help.

Think about your experience as a newcomer. If you are anything like I was, you were nervous, not sure if you wanted to be there, or anywhere for that matter. I remember that I decided to go to the meeting in topsiders, Levi's and an Izod instead of my punk rock regular persona (think 80's Joan Jett, sort of). I was hoping to not fit in, to leave the meeting saying to myself, "I tried it, but obviously I'm not like them." Because the meeting attendees took the 12th Step seriously, I felt relatively safe. They talked about the first step. Women (exclusively) came over to me after and offered me their numbers. I felt welcome, not pressured. Recovery looked good. I stayed.



In general terms, the service position entails maintenance of the AAGainesville.org website, including all the menu links, the databases, and the administrative business with the hosting company. At present, the finances of the hosting and domain-name renewals are also handled by the Webmaster. Details are given below the suggested list of qualifications.

- · HTML: The fundamental language of the world wide web. Nothing else makes sense without this.
- CSS: Although some HTML styling tags can still be used, most are deprecated, and all of our website is styled with CSS.
- JavaScript: A lot of functionality, such as error-checking and loading code segments related to user-specified choices, is done with JavaScript.
- PHP: Even more of the interactive functions are done at the server level with PHP, such as inclusion of
 code stubs, the creation of Meeting Schedules, and the data link to the Meeting Guide app, among others.
- MySQL: All the data used for the in-person Meeting Schedules and Special Events listings is kept in MySQL databases. Knowing how to work with them is vital.
- Image editing: Photoshop, GIMP, or some other image editing software is frequently needed to convert
 files and sometimes to provide a bit of graphical design help as well.
