Even though I thought I still had a pretty good or thirteen then, so my drinking career started life and some success, my life was a rollercoaster, slowly. However, I drank every chance I got, mainly eventually losing everything. The day finally came when somebody bought it for us—even in middle when I had to choose life over alcohol, so I decided school. One of my friends looked like he was thirty, on life instead. I was headed to the bitter end of jails so we would get him to buy it.

Then high school came after being thrown out of middle school. I started high school rough. I skipped school on the first day and was expelled for drinking beer on school property in the second semester of ninth grade.

Once I finally hit twenty-one, it was a wrap. I could drink when I wanted. Nobody could tell me anything. I never thought I was an alcoholic. However, I never thought I would quit drinking, even though I would pass out on the patio drinking after work, brush

For many in AA, step 8 is the most difficult. This is because it's the point in the steps of Alcoholics Anonymous in which you make a list of the people you've caused harm to because of your drinking.

It's one thing to face the damage created by alcoholism with yourself and your Higher Power or God — you did this during your moral inventory. Even admitting to someone who can relate is easier than discussing things with those you've harmed. But step 8 allows you to begin a life of peace and start to deal with personal relations.

Recovering alcoholics often see step 4 of the 12-step process as personal house cleaning. Step 8 is similar, but more about cleaning up your social house.

Step 8 is important because it enables you to move on to rebuilding relationships that were damaged. It doesn't guarantee this will happen, but the step is the first toward achieving this.

It's also about taking responsibility for your role and cleaning up your side of things during addiction recovery and in life. This includes holding yourself accountable for your actions, but not exaggerating the shortcomings of yourself or others. Even if the harm caused to the relationship was mutual, in this step you're preparing to right your wrongs.

Finally, this step is important because it continues the honest present in the previous steps. As most AA participants will confirm, honesty provides freedom and opens the doors to joy.

Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special Workers.

This Tradition is sometimes misunderstood by some members of our fellowship because they only live in one of our three A.A. Legacies: Recovery. These members, some of them having been in A.A. for years, do not understand how our Central Offices and our General Service Office in New York operate and make all the Twelfth Step work possible.

In Tradition 2, our co-founder Bill W. writes about the time when he had an opportunity to become a paid professional at the hospital where he detoxed and found sobriety. He took the good news regarding his job offer to his Home Group and the group fell silent. One of the group members finally exclaimed, "Don't you realize you can never become a professional?" It became clear to those early members that no one in A.A. should never ask or accept payment for "carrying this message to somebody else, person-to-person and face-to-face."

When many Intergroup offices began opening up in the U.S. and Canada, they were first staffed by volunteers. Problems began to occur because many of them had jobs and sometimes they couldn't keep the office commitment. It became necessary to employ an Office Manager and make sure that they were paid on a scale comparable to profit-making enterprises. The important thing to remember regarding these special workers is they are not being paid to do Twelfth Step work, they are being paid to make Twelfth Step work possible.

When I was elected Delegate for NE Ohio Area 54, I actually became a Special Worker. I was assigned a Conference Committee (Finance) and had to attend two General Service Conferences in New York. I was to be voting on Agenda Items that would be affecting the entire A.A. membership in the U.S. and Canada. My plane fare to and from N.Y., my hotel room, all of my meals and service materials were paid for by A.A. World Services Inc., one of our two Service Corporations. The other Service Corporation is the A.A. Grapevine, Inc.
