Clearing the Clutter: A Spiritual Fall Cleaning



When fall rolls around, I start feeling that itch to clean things up. I open the windows, toss old papers, and maybe even pull out the vacuum. There's something peaceful about getting rid of stuff that's just taking up space. It makes me think about how recovery works the same way. Step Ten tells us to "continue to take personal inventory and when we were wrong, promptly admit it." In other words, we keep cleaning house... not just the one we live in, but the one inside us.

Over time, little bits of emotional clutter start to build up. Maybe it's a resentment we didn't deal with, or a sharp word we wish we could take back. Sometimes it's fear or pride sneaking in again. We might not notice it right away, but soon it starts to weigh us down. Just like a messy room, it's hard to relax when our minds are full of old junk.

Step Ten gives us a way to clear it out before it piles up. I like to think of it as doing a little "spiritual tidying." When I stop to look honestly at my day, I can see where I fell short and where I did things right. It's not about beating myself up. It's about staying honest and free.

Some people write a quick list at night. Others do a little check-in during the day. I've found that asking a few simple questions helps: Was I kind? Did I act out of fear or love? Do I owe anyone an apology? Have I done something I need to set right?

If I'm honest, I can usually tell when I'm skipping my daily cleaning. I start feeling irritated, judgmental, or restless. I might replay a conversation over and over in my head, trying to prove I was right. But when I stop and take that short inventory, I feel lighter. It's like sweeping away dust that was blocking the light.

I've learned that humility and honesty don't make me weak. They give me peace. When I admit my part quickly, I don't have to carry guilt or resentment into tomorrow. And when I let go of control, I find that my Higher Power can do a much better job than I can.

Fall is a good reminder that letting go can be beautiful. The trees don't fight to hold on to their leaves. They release them and make room for something new. We can do the same in recovery. When we let go of anger, fear, and pride, we make space for gratitude, love, and peace. Every time I work Step Ten, I find a little more freedom. It keeps my spirit fresh and my relationships healthy. It reminds me that progress matters more than perfection.

So this season, while I'm cleaning out closets or raking leaves, I'll take time to do some spiritual cleaning too. I'll look for the places where I can admit wrongs, say I'm sorry, or simply start fresh. Each time I do, I find a little more light and a lot more peace. That's the real gift of Step Ten, learning how to keep our inner lives clear so we can stay connected, honest, and free.

Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.



Tradition Ten is one of those that quietly protects the fellowship from distractions. It reminds us that A.A. exists for one purpose only: to help the alcoholic who still suffers. Whenever personal opinions, politics, or outside causes creep into our conversations, this Tradition invites us to step back and remember why we are here.

Many of us come into the program with strong opinions about everything. We want to debate, explain, or fix the world. But A.A. is not a platform for causes or arguments. It is a place for recovery. The moment we take sides on outside issues, we risk dividing the very unity that keeps us alive and sober.

This Tradition does not mean we stop caring about the world around us. It simply means that within A.A., we focus on what we do best: sharing experience, strength, and hope. Each member is free to hold their own beliefs outside the meeting rooms, but inside, we set those differences aside for the common good.

Tradition Ten also helps me personally. It teaches me to practice restraint of tongue and pen, to pause before reacting, and to ask whether speaking my opinion will help or harm. Sometimes silence is the most spiritual action I can take. By keeping A.A. out of controversy, we protect its message and its members. When we stay focused on recovery rather than debate, newcomers find a safe and welcoming space where the only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking.

Step Ten reminds us that spiritual growth isn't a finish line. It's a daily practice. "Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it." Those words sound simple, but they invite us to live with a kind of honesty that doesn't come naturally to most of us. For many of us, drinking helped us avoid facing our mistakes. Now, in sobriety, Step Ten gives us a tool to face them head-on, before resentment, fear, or ego take hold again.

For me, Step Ten is like brushing my teeth. If I skip it for too long, I start to feel the buildup: irritability, self-righteousness, impatience. Maybe I snap at someone, justify my behavior, or start feeling superior. The problem isn't that I still have those feelings. It's that I sometimes forget to notice them until they've caused harm. Step Ten invites me to pause, take stock, and clean up the mess right away.

In the beginning, my inventories were long and dramatic, often done after something blew up. Over time, though, I've learned that Step Ten doesn't have to be a crisis tool. It can be a quiet, steady practice. A quick review before bed. A moment of honesty during the day. A deep breath before reacting. Sometimes it's as simple as saying, "I was wrong about that," or "I'm sorry for the way I spoke to you."

What makes this Step so powerful is its humility. It teaches me that admitting wrongs isn't about shame; it's about freedom. Every time I own my part, I lighten the load I carry. I stop letting small things grow into big ones. And I keep my relationships with myself, others, and my Higher Power clear and honest.

Working Step Ten also helps me see patterns. I start to recognize when certain fears or expectations are creeping back in. I can ask myself questions like:

- Was I kind today?
- Did I act out of fear or faith?
- Did I owe anyone an apology?
- Have I been patient and loving toward myself?

These little check-ins remind me that recovery isn't about being flawless; it's about staying awake to my humanity.

I once heard someone share that Step Ten is the "maintenance step," but I think of it as the "growth step." It's what keeps my recovery alive and evolving. Each time I practice it, I discover new ways to respond rather than react. I become more forgiving, less defensive, and more willing to learn.

In the end, Step Ten keeps me grounded in reality, not in who I wish I were, but in who I am right now: a person doing her best, learning to live honestly, and willing to keep trying. When I remember that progress, not perfection, is the goal, I can face my mistakes with grace. And when I promptly admit them, I get to keep the peace of mind and connection that brought me to recovery in the first place.

Meeting Opened with Serenity Prayer

Office Manager's Report, AO: AO continues to negotiate with AT&T on the phone system, which may include a cell phone instead of a land line. AO shared about the Intergroup/ Central Office of AA Seminar that she was able to participate in. One of the takeaways were the unique ways groups were fundraising; such as selling books at AA events. She is also looking at training someone to be the next office manager (an officer-manager-in-waiting), who can support her and take over the role when she needs to step down. A motion was presented to allow AO to end the contract with Westfield Insurance and to begin the insurance coverage with the Non-Profit Alliance. The cost of the policy would be \$2,700 per year. The motion was seconded, and all voted in favor.

DCM Report: The DCM reviewed Area 14 scholarship opportunities and reminded members of the upcoming District 14 inventory (due in December, to be compiled in January). It was confirmed that District 14 will host its own Service Fair. The DCM emphasized principles from Tradition Nine and Concept Nine, highlighting service leadership, humility, and effective group functioning.

Alt. DCM Report: The Alt. DCM reported on the Labor Day speaker meeting and the upcoming Triangle Club Talent Show (September 20). Coordination of the District 14 Service Fair is ongoing, with committee chairs asked to finalize flyers by the newsletter deadline.

Archives: Work Day scheduled for October 11, 9:00 AM, Triangle Club Gratitude Room. Focus on organizing group histories and transferring analog materials into digital formats.

Corrections: Ongoing need for volunteers; applicants must notify the committee after applying. Expansion continues into state facilities, including meetings at Lowell Women's Prison in partnership with District 27.

CPC/PI: Digital Adopt-a-Doc packets completed for website publication. Committee to staff the Recovery 5K (Sept. 20) and Together We Rise (Oct. 11). Plans include supplying Big Books to local libraries and producing AA business cards with hotline number and QR code.

Grapevine & Literature: No meeting held due to holiday. Next scheduled meeting: October 6.

Treatment: Continued reports of AA presence in treatment facilities. Committee is coordinating literature distribution and outreach efforts.

Website Committee: All flyers and digital materials must be submitted at least 48 hours before publication for inclusion in the Post newsletter and website posting. Committee confirmed readiness to upload resources such as Adopt-a-Doc packets. Emphasized the importance of strong communication between committees and the webmaster.
