

The Gold at the End of the Rainbow

March arrives brushed in green, carrying the playful shimmer of St. Patrick's Day. There is something timeless about the stories that come with it. We hear of luck, of clovers hidden in plain sight, and of that shining pot of gold waiting at the end of a rainbow. For many of us in Alcoholics Anonymous, the idea of "luck" can feel distant. Our journeys often read less like fairy tales and more like storms we barely survived. Yet if we stay, if we work, if we walk this path together, we discover something deeper than luck. We discover a life that feels like a quiet miracle.

When we first come into the rooms, the Twelve Steps can look like a horizon we cannot quite reach. We begin anyway. Step by step, sometimes crawling, sometimes walking, sometimes being carried by others who understand. Along the way, something subtle begins to change. The chaos that once defined us starts to loosen its grip. The noise quiets. The rainbow, once far away, begins to take shape not in the distance, but within our daily lives.

By the time we arrive at Step Twelve, we find ourselves in a place that the "Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions" describes as the beginning of true joy in living. This is not the kind of joy that depends on circumstances going our way. It is not loud or flashy. It is steady. It is the kind of joy that shows up in small moments, like a genuine laugh, a clear morning, or the simple ability to sit with ourselves in peace.

Step Twelve asks us to carry the message and to practice these principles in all our affairs. At first glance, it might seem like a responsibility, something we are obligated to do. But in practice, it becomes a gift. When we reach out to another alcoholic, when we share our story honestly, when we offer a hand without expecting anything in return, we step into a new way of living. The focus shifts from what we can get to what we can give. And strangely, in giving, we receive more than we ever could have chased.

This is where the image of the pot of gold begins to transform. It is not waiting somewhere far off, hidden at the end of a perfect journey. It is found in the act of walking the path itself. It is found in service, in connection, in showing up when it would be easier to disappear. The gold is not a reward for being lucky. It is the natural result of a life lived with purpose.

The Big Book speaks to this through what we call "The Promises." We are told that we will know a new freedom and a new happiness. We will not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it. We will comprehend the word serenity and we will know peace. These are not empty words.

Community News

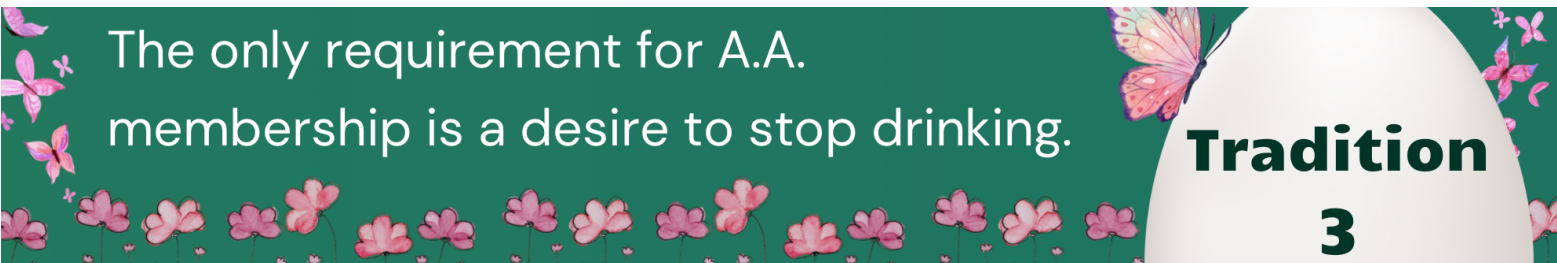

This tradition seems to create more controversy at the A.A. Group level than any of the other eleven traditions. Sometimes I think the long form of this tradition should be posted (along with our A.A. slogans) for all to see when anyone attends a meeting of A.A.

Bill W., one of our Co-Founders who wrote this tradition probably said it best; "You are an A.A. member if you say so. No matter what you have done, or still will do, you are an A.A. member as long as you say so."

The unique feature of this tradition is that A.A. is probably the most inclusive organization that was ever created. Our Society was inclusive at a time when many of our members could never assemble in the United States. Eventually, the rest world caught up but A.A. is essentially a society within a society. My first A.A. Sponsor (who got sober on March 19, 1966) used to say to me "We don't care if you are from Yale or from Jail, sit down up front and take the cotton out of your ears and stick it in your mouth!"

When a newcomer finally attends an A.A. meeting, I firmly believe they are not sure what their affliction is. If they are a problem drinker it is the members of that A.A. group to find out if they are a real alcoholic. When some of our new members come from drying out spots that may be profit-oriented such as a treatment facility, they are allowed to identify themselves if they think they may have more than one problem. An example of this is when a member introduces themselves as an alcoholic/addict. Essentially all you have to say is that you are an A.A. member and you are really on the road to recovery when you join an A.A. Group.

Many A.A. groups today have integrated into their meeting formats a "Blue Card" that is read at the beginning of each meeting. The "Blue Card" can be used at both open and closed meetings of A.A. The "Blue Card" is essentially a "heads up" that if you share at an A.A. meeting, we can only discuss our problems with alcohol and the disease of Alcoholism.

Our A.A. literature carries our message also. There is a Service piece of A.A. literature titled "*Information on Alcoholics Anonymous*" which is a valuable tool for anyone new attending A.A. The pamphlet titled "*The A.A. Group... Where It All Begins*" is probably the most comprehensive pamphlet published by our General Service Office. This pamphlet protects our A.A. message also because it includes our A.A. Traditions and their importance for our society to survive.



Step 3

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him.

Step Three is often described as a turning point, but it can feel more like standing at the edge of a diving board, looking down into water you cannot fully see. The step asks us to make a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understand Him. That sentence is simple, but living it can feel anything but simple.

Before coming into Alcoholics Anonymous, many of us lived as if we were both the director and the entire cast of our lives. We tried to control outcomes, manage perceptions, and force the world to bend to our expectations. When things did not go our way, we adjusted the script, pushed harder, or escaped altogether. It was exhausting, and for many of us, it led us deeper into isolation and alcohol.

Step Three offers a different way. It does not demand perfection or complete understanding. It asks for a decision. Not a lifetime contract signed in certainty, but a willingness to begin letting go of the idea that we are in charge of everything. It invites us to consider that perhaps our way has not been working as well as we once believed.

This step is closely tied to the first two. In Step One, we admit that we are powerless over alcohol and that our lives have become unmanageable. In Step Two, we come to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity. Step Three builds on that foundation. If we believe help is possible, are we willing to accept it? Are we willing to trust something beyond our own thinking?

For many, the word “God” can be a stumbling block. Alcoholics Anonymous wisely leaves room for each person to define a Higher Power in their own way. What matters is not the label, but the shift in perspective. Step Three asks us to move from self-reliance alone to a kind of shared reliance, where we are no longer carrying the full weight of life by ourselves.

The Third Step Prayer, found in the Big Book, captures the spirit of this decision. It speaks of offering ourselves to be built with and to do with as God wills. It asks for relief from the bondage of self so that we may better carry out that will. There is a quiet freedom in those words. They suggest that we do not have to figure everything out. We do not have to force solutions or control every outcome. We can participate in life rather than trying to dominate it.

In practical terms, Step Three shows up in small, daily choices. It might look like pausing before reacting in anger. It might mean asking for guidance instead of rushing into decisions. It can be as simple as admitting, in a difficult moment, that we do not have all the answers and being open to another way.

Letting go of control does not mean becoming passive or careless. It means shifting our role. Instead of trying to run the entire show, we become willing actors who trust that there is a larger direction at work. We still take action, make amends, and show up for our responsibilities. The difference is that we are no longer driven by fear, ego, or the need to control every detail.

Over time, many of us begin to notice a change. Life does not suddenly become perfect, but it becomes more manageable. Situations that once overwhelmed us can be faced with a sense of calm. Decisions become clearer. We begin to feel less alone. This is the quiet promise of Step Three. Not that everything will go our way, but that we will not have to face it all on our own.

Step Three is not a one-time event. It is a decision we revisit again and again, especially when life feels uncertain. Each time we choose to turn our will and our lives over, we strengthen that trust. Each time we let go, even a little, we create space for something better to take root.

In the end, Step Three is about surrender, but not in the sense of defeat. It is a surrender that opens the door to freedom. It is the moment we step off the diving board, not knowing exactly how the water will feel, but trusting that we will be held when we land.

DCM Report

Pre-Conference Workshop scheduled March 14 (3–5 PM) with participation encouraged across Districts 16, 17, and 24. Focus includes review of Proposed Agenda Items (PAIs) for the General Service Conference. Florida State Convention (Aug 6–9, Orlando) expected to reach high capacity; members encouraged to attend and bring group conscience forward.

Alternate DCM Report

Welcomed new GSRs and reinforced their role in service. Encouraged attendance at Area Assemblies (goal: 3 of 4 annually). District continues to support lodging (1 night covered). Members interested in future rotation (2027–2029) encouraged to connect and participate in service development.

Treasurer's Report

Opening Balance: \$10,525.30 | Contributions: \$1,253.70 | Adjustments: +\$105.13 | Expenses: \$27.00
Closing Balance: \$11,857.13. Contributions remain strong and report was approved by the body.

Committee Reports

Accessibility: Continued meetings at Grace Marketplace; development of centralized website resource hub.

Archives: Ongoing collection of group histories; display project and inventory workday in progress.

Corrections: Workshop scheduled March 28 (Triangle Club); urgent need for male volunteers; expanded women's meetings at Lowell facility.

CPC/PI: "Adopt-A-Doc" materials submitted online; printed packets remain available.

Grapevine: Increasing presence at events; expanding literature and raffle engagement.

Literature: New 12 Concepts animated resource available through AA channels.

Treatment: 40 meetings carried into 6 facilities in January; volunteers needed (MIST and VA).

Intergroup / Website: Exploring workshops (chairing, writing); continued website improvements and event listings.

Old Business

Open service positions: Alternate DCM and Alternate Secretary. Members encouraged to stand for service and support district continuity.

New Business – Budget & Sustainability

Discussion centered on long-term financial outlook, with projections indicating potential reduction of funds within 4–5 years under current trends.

Options discussed:

1. Increase group contributions
2. Reduce committee budgets
3. Shift certain responsibilities to Intergroup

Strong group sentiment supported maintaining District committee structure and services.
